Winter Safety Checklist

 Exterior Prep & Snow Management Schedule snow removal, plowing, de-icing before and during guest stays. Provide snow shovels, deicer and ice scrapers, so guests can safely manage light snow. Brighten paths, driveways and entryways with LED lights to improve visibility and safety. Inspect steps, mats and railings and address any areas that could cause slips and falls. Shut off outdoor faucets and cover them with insulated faucet covers.
Plumbing & Utilities Protection
□ Set thermostats to at least 55°F, even during vacancy periods, to prevent freezing.
□ Run indoor drips during extreme cold snaps.
□ Insulate exposed pipes in the basement, garage and crawlspaces by wrapping foam
insulation or heat tape around them.
□ Inspect your heating systems before the season begins.
